



From the Minister - Rev Dr Allan Vint

The summer holidays this year afforded Lynne and I the opportunity to meet up with family down South, we were also very fortunate to be able to go on a short cruise, stopping at Vigo, Lisbon, Porto and Guernsey. Each port provided a wealth of heritage, history and culture for us to learn, enjoy and reflect on.



In Vigo we boarded an excursion to the very impressive Santiago de Compostela Cathedral in northwestern Spain, a shrine bult to honour James, one of the disciples of Jesus. The Cathedral also serves as the destination of the Way of St. James, a pilgrimage route since the 9th century. We were struck by the many (mainly) young men and women with backpacks travelling the pilgrimage way, which takes some 30 days to complete on foot – what a devotional journey to make.

In Lisbon, thronging with people, we witnessed a man also walking but this time with a placard which announced, 'Jesus is the way to Heaven'. Not too

many people seemed to take notice of this brief but important message -

perhaps it was drowned out by every other surrounded notice, like the one he inadvertently was standing beside, 'No Sushi, no life'. Isn't it interesting which messages we choose to 'tune in' and which we choose to 'tune out'.







Our stop in Porto (which provides the name for the whole country, Portugal) was to the UNESCO World Heritage Site of the old town beside the river. This was a place of trade going back through the centuries. Until recently the town had been largely run down but with investment from the international community it is now a busy, flourishing tourist hub.



Finally, we reached St Peter Port in Guernsey, where we were to learn of the World War 2 German occupation of the island. This was a period of great anxiety for the islanders as Guernsey was turned into a German fortress, largely

through the efforts of slave labour. Although the island guns were to see little, even no real action, we were reminded again of the evils of war

through the imprisonment, oppression and killing which did take place.

Our holiday travels gave us much to reflect on and so very much to be thankful for. We rejoice in the love we share within family and with friends. We are so grateful for the joy we have for today and the peace for tomorrow through Jesus. We recognise how fortunate we are to have liberty and freedom to be a pilgrim following Jesus each day. As we do that, we value afresh the freedoms we have to worship and to live out our daily life without fear or repression.
