



#### From the Minister - Rev Dr Allan Vint

It is the time of year when, in Scotland and around the world, much is spoken about the great Scottish bard Robert Burns. Of course, here in Mauchline there is perhaps greater attention given to him and his works since it was in these parts for many years he lived and matured in his gifting.


The man in life, wherever plac'd
Hath happiness in store
Who walks not in the wicked's way
Nor learns their guilty lore!

Not from the seat of scornful pride Cast forth his eyes abroad, But with humility and awe Still walks before his God

Paraphrase 1<sup>st</sup> Psalm Robert Burns

Besides being a local resident Burns was also a member of the church and subject to the good and bad of its time. As someone who paid close attention to the Bible (he knew it well), the church (being aware of its strengths and of its weaknesses) and of course church people (he was also keenly acquaint with human faults and failings — often from personal experience!) - meaning he had much to say about each.

In Christian beliefs Robert Burns was a moderate, aligning himself with the 'New Licht' outlook of some contemporary Church ministers. Those who took a more conservative, approach became the subject of some harsh words from the poet. For example, Robert expressed his dissatisfaction



writing to a local minister (a new Licht) called Rev John McMath.

But I gae mad at their grimaces,
Their sighin, cantin, grace-proud faces,
Their three-mile prayers, an' half-mile graces,
Their raxin conscience,
Whase greed, revenge, an' pride disgraces
Waur nor their nonsense.

None of us is perfect, this much is very true – the poet knew it in himself and was well able to highlight his own weaknesses and doubts.

He did however take exception to those who were hypocritical –

putting on a display of piety and goodness whilst clearly being flawed in so many aspects of their life and attitude. Famously in 'Holy Willie's Prayer he pokes fun at such as these.

Robert Burns does us a favour by shining such a strong light on such things because it forces us all to take stock of our own life. What do I believe and why? Am I authentic and true or am I hypocritical? We might also ponder, like the poet, our own mortality and where we might be eternally destined, certainly it caused Burn to once pray:

O, aid me with Thy help, Omnipotence Divine! O Thou, who in the heavens does dwell,

Who, as it pleases best Thysel', Sends ane to heaven an' ten to hell,

A' for Thy glory, And no for ony gude or ill They've done afore Thee!

I bless and praise Thy matchless might,

When thousands Thou hast left in night,

That I am here afore Thy sight,
For gifts an' grace
A burning and a shining light
To a' this place.
