



From the Minister - Rev Dr Allan Vint



On Sunday, 25th May at 3pm, a group from the congregation gathered at the Martyrs' Memorial on Loan Green for a special remembrance conventicle service.

The outdoor gathering was to honour the memory of the five Covenanter martyrs executed in Mauchline in 1685, as well as James Smith, the fellow Covenanter buried in the churchyard. Mr Dane Love provided the history of the events, placing them helpfully into their historical context and also highlighting the part other Mauchline people played during the covenanting era.

Many of you will be well acquainted with the striking obelisk at Loan Green commemorating the "Mauchline Martyrs." They were Peter Gillies (Skirling), John Bryce (West Calder), William Fiddison and John Young (both from Carluke), and John Browning from Galston-all Covenanters, victims of the harsh crackdown of 1685.

These men of the loan were captured and brought to Mauchline, where they were tried by Lieutenant-General Drummond, who was stationed at Mauchline castle, and they hanged without the chance for a proper farewell or even a final prayer. Their bodies were buried together in a trench near the execution site, now marked by the impressive obelisk and the older gravestone nearby.

In the churchyard itself lies James Smith, another Covenanter who died in 1685. Smith was wounded while helping others escape from prison at





Newmilns, captured, and died of his injuries in Mauchline before he could be executed. His grave, marked with a blue plaque, is a quieter but no less powerful reminder of the sacrifices made for faith and freedom
